AA TIME CAPSULE

Jack J. (JERSEY JACK), PART 2 of 3

On one night, Jack attended a larger meeting with Danny at one of the halls. Danny told Jack to meet him there early to help set up the chairs and tables and blow-up balloons before the meeting began. It was an AA sponsored New Year's Eve party. When the meeting began and Jack saw that no one had saved him a seat, he copped a resentment and a big chip on his shoulders. Jack then openly announced that he had the drinking problem licked so he was just going to focus on the smoking issue. As expected, it was suggested that he "take first things first." Resentment is the number one offender and after 64 days without a drink, Jack picked up again on Tuesday, New Year's Day, 1974.

Jack drank continuously from Tuesday through Sunday, January 6th, 1974. Jack drank heavily for five straight days, in a black out most of the time. On Sunday morning., Jack woke up and looked in the mirror and could not believe what he saw. Jack, the handsome man in a United States Navy uniform was gone. In the mirror he saw an old guy with sunken eyes and pale skin. He immediately called Danny. Jack had not shaved, showered, or cleaned his apartment in days. Danny showed up minutes later with three other alcoholics and cleaned Jack's entire apartment for him and took him to a meeting. Jack was sweating, shaking through the entire meeting and then a guy sitting next to him told him something he will never forget: "**You never have to feel this way again.**" And Jack never did.

Jack started regularly attending meetings, making coffee, cleaning ashtrays and started to become part of AA instead of looking from the outside in. (This writer's dear friend and old sponsor often described this transition like the red coin we see handed out. It is smooth in the middle and its rough on the outside).

Jack had finally hit his bottom and went to meetings and enjoyed himself. Even today one can find Jack at the door of the Tuesday Hernando Beach meeting greeting everyone with a smile. (Pre-Covid-19)

After one year of sobriety Jack attended a Matt Talbot retreat. (Matt is a Dublin-born Irish alcoholic who, after hitting bottom at the age of 28, hit his knees and took a pledge before G_D to never drink again. He died a sober man and spent most of his life helping men get and stay sober. He is often referred to as the Patron Saint of struggling and recovering alcoholics).

It was at this retreat where Jack first truly learned about the 12 steps and how to practice them in his life. One slogan Jack recalls from that retreat in a vivid details is: "If G_D seems far away, THINK, who has moved.?"

From the beginning Jack's main drinking buddy was his girlfriend who eventually ended up in Alanon. She traveled with Jack to Colorado to attend the 40th International A.A. Convention. Jack was excited, but little did he know that he would end up having lunch with (Q6)**Lois Wilson** and shaking her hand..

Notwithstanding this experience, when Jack arrived back home from Colorado, he found himself unable to sleep one evening and at 2:30 Am., it was the first time Jack had an incredible strong urge to drink again. He began to sweat profusely and was so scared he dropped to his knees and begged G-D to help keep him from a drink. Jack had a spiritual awakening that he felt from the tips of his toes to the top of his head and is something he will never forget. The next day he called his friend Reggie, who told Jack he could call anytime if he ever needed him. Reggie to Jack: You can call me anytime, but you called on someone higher the me, God" And the book does say "The Alcoholic at certain times has no effective mental defense against the first drink. Except in a few rare cases, neither he nor any other human being can provide such a defense. His defense must come from a Higher Power.

3rd Step

She has learned to do the best she can with what she has

RECENTLY, I stood in the middle of my kitchen floor and prayed, "God help me," as I frequently do, and as I learned to do some twenty years ago when I got sober in AA. But on this occasion, the prayer was inspired by the galling, gnawing, incessant outrage I felt at a problem that has threatened to overwhelm me for the past fifteen years. "It's unfair," I said, and I realized as I said it that I sounded like my fourteen-year-old daughter.

"What are you going to do about it?" a little inner voice asked, "Do?" I replied. "What I've always been taught to do in AA. I'm going to confess it."

And this I proceeded to do, with an AA member who was then a guest in my home. We both agreed that it *was* unfair. In this mood, I returned to my kitchen and again said, "God help me."

At that instant, the telephone rang. It was another member of AA, and she, too, was finding life "unfair." I agreed, as I attempted to show her that the answer to her problem lay in the acceptance of the Third Step, in surrender, in turning her will and her life over to the care of God, I found the answer to my own problem. I thought I had surrendered it, but I had merely refused to look at it--I had swept it under the rug.

Surrender is not a repressive thing; it's an active opening up of one's inner self; it's saying--and meaning--"I'll take my chances with life. There is no guarantee that I'm going to make it, but I'm going to face it, and I'm going to do the best I can with what I've got."

The AA way of life is not easy; we were never told that it would be. But I have found it to be the most exhilarating, the most exciting mode of existence that I can possibly imagine. I have found in AA all that I ever sought in drinking. I can choose to believe in myself today, in my own thinking and my own feelings. I can choose to live today. I can live in the light of that choice today. If I make mistakes (as I frequently do), I can say I'm sorry and learn from that mistake--and each time I make a mistake, I learn a new truth. But truth is not an absolute, and I have a long way to go before I sleep.

Tradition Three:

You Can't Have One Without the Other.

The Third Step and the Third Tradition are interconnected by the mere fact that without a Higher Power of your understanding you will not get sober and if you do not have the desire to stop drinking you will have a difficult time being a member in good standing of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Step 3 - "Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him."

Tradition 3 - "The only requirement for AA membership is a desire to stop drinking."

Which do you do first ? ? ?.

Makes no never mind, as long as you do them both and understand that the Steps are to save us from ourselves and that the Traditions are to save us from each other.

For the alcoholic who wants to isolate, be alone, push away anyone who loves them, and to kill themselves, the idea of God doing for them what they could not do for themselves is a difficult concept to grasp. However, A.A. is a we program and the more we invite God and the group into our lives the easier it becomes to achieve sobriety, serenity and peace of mind.

Today, follow a few suggestions, get a sponsor who will help you better understand the Steps and the Traditions, don't think, don't drink, go to meetings and don't dance around the edge of the program, try to spend as much time on getting sober as you did trying to feed your addiction.

Recovery is following suggestions and working both the Steps and the Traditions. Sobriety is a blessing from a Higher Power.

Tradition III

1. In my mind, do I prejudge some new AA members as losers?
2. Is there some kind of alcoholic whom I privately do not want in my AA group?
3. Do I set myself up as a judge of whether a newcomer is sincere or phony?
4. Do I let language, religion (or lack of it), race, education, age, or other such things interfere with my carrying the message?
5. Am I overimpressed by a celebrity? By a doctor, a clergyman, an ex-convict? Or can I just treat this new member simply and naturally as one more sick human, like the rest of us?
6. When someone turns up at AA needing information or help (even if he can't ask for it aloud), does it really matter to me what he does for a living? Where he lives? What his domestic arrangements are? Whether he had been to AA before? What his other problems are?

Concepts Checklist

Concept III: To insure effective leadership, we should endow each element of A.A. —the Conference, the General Service Board and its service corporations, staffs, committees, and executives—with a traditional "Right of Decision."

- Do we understand what is meant by the "Right of Decision"? Do we grant it at all levels of service or do we "instruct"?
- Do we trust our trusted servants — G.S.R., D.C.M., area delegate, the Conference itself?

GRAPEVINE (Generate Interest)

The Grapevine Chair shares information about the AA Grapevine and La Vina our unique "Meeting in Print"

PARLIAMENTARIAN (Ensure Meeting Integrity)

This position is a two-year term that is appointed by the DCM. Duties include: attend monthly District meetings, assist in keeping the meeting operating within Roberts Rule of Order, and must have a Working Knowledge of District 13 Structures and Guidelines. Contact the DCM if interested.

LITERATURE (spread the word)

The Literature Chair keeps the local groups up to date on all conference approved literature, audio, visual material or other special items.

ACCESSIBILITY (Assist those with limited accessibilities)

The chairperson provides support and helps to carry the message to those who have accessibility issues that can limit their attendance at regular A.A. meetings.

ARCHIVES (Preserve District History)

This is a 2-year position that requires familiarity with District history. Ensuring proper cataloging and storage with an understanding of historical records.

CORRECTIONS (Share AA message with inmates)

The Correction Committee Chair coordinates meetings that carry the message in prisons and jails to those that cannot attend regular AA meetings.
