The Woman in The Mirror

I grew up in the town of Linden, New Jersey where I lived with my parents and a younger brother. I was an extremely shy and introverted child and always felt like I did not fit in. Growing up my shyness was often misinterpreted by my peers and led to my being bullied throughout my school years.

It was at the age of 14 when I experienced my first drink. It was at a "get-together" with a much-older crowd where a vodka-laced punch was being served. I was handed a drink, and my first sip convinced me that this elixir was the answer to my problems. It was at that moment I believed I had arrived and became the life of the party! No more hiding for me! Little did I know that I would drink alcoholically over the next 17 years and that I would destroy everything I touched. I became a liar, a cheat, and a thief. Alcohol had become my master that told me what to do and when to do it.

Eventually I got married and had two children. Unfortunately, my drinking interfered with my ability to be a good wife or a mother to those two young girls. My drinking continued to get worse and worse, and after years of fighting and insanity that marriage was dissolved. Hopelessness prevailed. During those years my father had been my protector, and when he passed away unexpectedly, I was devastated. Who was going to rescue me now? It was shortly after his death that I made yet another geographic move to Huntington, Long Island where I lived with my two little girls, ages 2 and 6. I got a job in New York City and continued to drink. My drinking alienated me from family and friends creating an overwhelming loneliness and despair, but I continued to drink. Then one day a friend stopped by my home on Thursday evening with a bottle of Tequila and offered me a drink. Usually, I would not turn down a drink under any circumstances, however, this time I resisted because the bottle of Tequila had a worm in the bottom, and that was disgusting to me so I turned him down. With a little coaxing, some salt in my palm, and a shot glass filled with that Tequila in the other, I drank it down, and I did not come out of the black-out until Saturday morning in a way I will never forget. ... had happened again, and I was overwhelmed with despair. It was at this time that I had a moment of clarity, and when I looked in my mirror, I saw clearly what I had become and knew alcohol was my problem and begged God for help. My prayer was answered when I opened my telephone book and looked up the word alcoholic and found a number for Alcoholics Anonymous, and I called it. That call led to my being picked up by two beautiful women who came to my home and brought me to my first AA meeting. As I walked into that meeting I was filled with shame, guilt, and remorse; I found people who welcomed me, told me I was in the right place, and encouraged me to come back. It was a speaker meeting and I listened and identified with both speakers and somehow knew I was in the right place.

On the way home from the meeting, the woman who was to become my sponsor told me several important things. She explained that in this program we don't drink one day at a time. She asked me to make 90 meetings in 90 days; to get a sponsor; to get a group; to make AA the most important thing in my life. Lastly, she said that if I followed the path that was going to be laid out for me, I would never have to drink again. These words gave me the hope that I needed and the willingness to follow her direction.

In my second year of sobriety, I met and married my second husband with whom I had two more children. It was a rocky marriage because he was an alcoholic who could not stop drinking. Ten years later we were divorced, and two years later he passed away. I was left alone with four children to take care of, and for the next five years I worked two jobs and took care of those children.

Five years later, I married my current husband who is also a member of AA, and we decided to retire and moved to Clearwater 12 years ago. It was only nine months ago that we moved to Spring Hill where once again we have found a home in AA. I am grateful to have received the gift of sobriety as are all my family and friends.

AA has become an active part of my life. The steps and the principles of AA have given me a recipe for living, and I must say I have a life beyond my wildest dreams. I have been blessed with sobriety, and each time I go to a meeting I am given yet another opportunity to learn how to become a better person. I have faith that allows me the ability to pass on to others what has been so freely given to me.

Acceptance

When I stopped living in the problem and began living in the answer, the problem went away. From that moment on, I have not had a single compulsion to drink. And acceptance is the answer to all my problems today. When I am disturbed, it is because I find some person, place, thing or situation - some fact of my life - unacceptable to me. I can find no serenity until I accept that person, place, thing or situation as being exactly the way it is supposed to be at this moment. Nothing, absolutely nothing, happens in God's world by mistake. Until I could accept my alcoholism, I could not stay sober; unless I accept life completely on life's terms, I cannot be happy. I need to concentrate not so much on what needs to be changed in the world as on what needs to be changed in me and my attitudes.

About Concept 3

As a traditional means of creating and maintaining a clearly defined working relation between the groups, the Conference, the A.A. General Service Board and its several service corporations, staffs, committees and executives, and of thus effective leadership, it is here suggested that we endow each of these elements of world services with traditional "Right of Decision."

A background for this Concept, you should be familiar with the Conference Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board, both of which are found in The A.A. Service Manual. For, except for the specific directions in these documents, every trusted servant and every A.A. entity at all levels of service — has the right "to decide … how they will interpret and apply their own authority and responsibility to each particular problem or situation as it arises." That is, they can "decide which problems they will dispose of themselves and upon which matters they will report, consult, or ask specific directions." This is "the essence of 'The Right of Decision.'"

But this right also means the Fellowship must have trust in its "trusted servants." If the groups instruct their G.S.R.s rather than giving them a "Right of Decision," then the area conference is hamstrung. If the G.S.R.s instruct the area delegates rather than giving them a "Right of Decision," then the General Service Conference is hamstrung. As Bill points out, "our Conference delegates are primarily the servants of A.A. as they should ... cast their votes ... according to the best dictates of their own judgment and conscience at that time."

Similarly, if the General Service Board, acting through its subsidiary boards, "were to attempt to manage" the General Service Office and the A.A. Grapevine "in detail, then ... the staff members ... would quickly become demoralized; they would be turned into buck-passers and rubber stamps; their choice would be to rebel and resign, or to submit and rot."

Bill warns against using "The Right of Decision" as an excuse for failure to make the proper reports of actions taken; or for exceeding a clearly defined authority; or for failing to consult the proper people before making an important decision. But he concludes:

"Our entire A.A. program rests squarely upon the principle of mutual trust. We trust God, we trust A.A., and we trust each other."

Step 3

Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood him.

Tradition 3 (Short Form)

The only requirement for AA membership is a desire to stop drinking.

Tradition 3 (Long Form)

Our membership ought to include all who suffer alcoholism. Hence, we may refuse none who wish to recover. Nor ought A.A. membership ever depend upon money or conformity. Any two or three alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an A.A. group, provided that, as a group, they have no other affiliation.

Concept 3

To insure effective leadership, we should endow each element of A.A.—the Conference, the General Service Board and its service corporations, staffs, committees, and executives—with a traditional "Right of Decision."


