## One DUI Too Many

When I was growing up, my dad's brothers were drinking all of the time, and I liked being around them because they seemed to be having a good time. My dad was always yelling at us when he got home from work. He was a workaholic and seemed to only care about working and money and impressing people. My uncles got me to taste beer sometimes, and I didn't like the taste, so I didn't drink more than sips.

The first time that I got drunk was when I was in 10th grade and went to a party. I got sick that night from drinking and said that I would never drink again. When I did drink again, I didn't drink enough to get drunk. That went on for some time. I could take it or leave it. I graduated high school in 1980, and the New Year's Eve of 1981 I got really drunk, got really sick and said that I would never drink again. It took a while, but I wound up drinking again. As time passed, I accumulated several DUI arrests. My drinking led to drug use, and I got arrested for that as well.

In 2004 I was arrested on a drug charge and went into Hernando County Drug Court. It's a voluntary program to keep from going to jail. I was ready to quit the drug that I got arrested for, but I wasn't ready to stop drinking. Part of the drug court program requirements was that I had to attend A.A. meetings. I came into A.A. then and continued to drink. About every two months I would drink, and alcohol would lead me back to that drug. I was in A.A., and I wasn't ready. I didn't see a problem with my drinking even though I had three DUIs.

On July 2nd 2005, I got my fourth DUI. That was my bottom. I finally became willing to get sober and do whatever it took to stay sober. It was a relief that the battle was over, and I had lost. I was really desperate not to drink again, so I got a sponsor and worked the twelve steps of A.A. I received the gift of sobriety on the seventh step when I received a sudden spiritual awakening, and the obsession was suddenly removed. The promises came true from the spiritual awakening, and it's been like looking at the world through a different set of eyes.

Because of my fourth DUI, the State of Florida had permanently removed my driver's license. I remained sober, and some people in A.A. signed forms that stated (under the penalty of perjury) that I had stayed sober. As a result, in April of 2012, my driver's license was reinstated.

## More About Concept 12 (Part II)

The column featured in the December 2023 issue of the *Communique* titled "About Concept 12" was, due to length, done in two parts. Part I consisted of the first three of the six Warranties. This second part carries the next three Warranties (4-6.)

In review of 1-3:

**Warranty One:** "The Conference shall never become the seat of perilous wealth or power."

**Warranty Two:** "Sufficient operating funds, plus an ample Reserve should be its prudent financial principle."

**Warranty Three:** "None of the conference members shall be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any others."

**Warranty Four:** That all important decisions should be reached by discussion, vote, and wherever possible, by substantial unanimity." This Warranty is, on the one hand, "a safeguard against any hasty or overbearing authority of simple majority; and on the other hand, it takes notice of the rights and the frequent wisdom of minorities, however small. This principle guarantees that all matters of importance, time permitting, will be extensively debated, and that such debates will continue until a really heavy majority can support every critical decision."

**Warranty Five:** "That no Conference action shall ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy." Although practically all other societies and governments find it necessary to punish individual members for violations of their beliefs, principles or law, Alcoholics Anonymous finds this practice unnecessary.

When we fail to follow sound spiritual principles, alcohol cuts us down. No humanly administered system of penalties is needed. This unique condition is an enormous advantage to us all, one on which we should never abandon by resorting to personal attack and punishment. Of all societies, ours can least afford to risk the resentments and conflicts which would result, were we ever to yield, to temptation to punish in anger.

For much the same reason, we cannot and should not enter into public controversy, even in self-defense. Our experience has shown that, providentially, A.A. has been made exempt from the need to quarrel with anyone, no matter what the provocation. Nothing could be more damaging to our unity and to the worldwide goodwill which A.A. enjoys, than public contention, no matter how promising the immediate dividends might appear.

Some situations which may require Conference consideration are:

A.A. may come under "sharp public attack or heavy ridicule" -- perhaps "With little or no justification in fact. Our best defense in these situations would be no defense whatever namely, complete silence at the public level. If the criticism of A.A. is partly or wholly justified, it may be well to acknowledge this privately to the critics -- with our thanks." →

## Step 1

We admitted that we were powerless over alcohol – that our lives had become unmanageable.

### Tradition 1 (Short Form)

Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity.

### Tradition 1 (Long Form)

Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. A.A. must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward.

Our own members may try to use the A.A. name for their private purpose. "Aggressive and punitive action, even in this area, must be omitted. Privately we can inform Tradition-violators that they are out of order. When they persist, we can use other resources of persuasion as we have. In the long run though, we shall have to rely mainly on the pressures of A.A. opinion and public opinion."

"Another kind of problem is the severe internal disagreement that comes to unwelcome public attention." As G.S.O. "is not a police operation," we can only offer A.A.'s experience as a matter of information.

**Warranty Six:** "That though the Conference may act for service of Alcoholic Anonymous, it shall never perform any act of government; and that, like the society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in thought and action."

The A.A. Traditions accord the individual member and the A.A. group extraordinary liberties. In fact, we A.A. 's probably enjoy more and greater freedoms than any Fellowship in the world. We claim this as no virtue. We know we have to choose conformity to A.A.'s Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions or else face dissolution and death.

"Because we set such a high value on our great liberties and cannot conceive that they will need to be limited, we here specially enjoin our General Service Conference to abstain completely from any and all acts of authoritative government which could in anyway curtail A.A.'s freedom under God. We expect our conference always to try to act in the spirit of mutual respect and love--one member to another.

"Freedom under God to grow in His likeness and May our General Service Conference be always seen as a chief symbol of this cherished liberty."

## INTERGROUP TREASURER'S REPORT FOR NOVEMBER 2023

## My Experience with Step One

Growing up, my family was very involved in church. I attended Sunday school and church service almost every week. Vacation bible school every year, and many church youth group functions. The God I was taught about was a loving, forgiving God who wanted us to be kind to one another and live by the golden rule. I never knew of a punishing or condemning God.

During my early teens, while away at a church youth retreat, I was troubled about how I had been living. I had been stealing money from my sister's purse, my dad's dresser, a few dollars here and there. I was frequently lying about things. I knew I wasn't living the way I should and it was weighing on me.

I began praying about it and asked God to forgive me for my sins and to help me be a better person. I had at that moment what I believe to be the same spiritual experience that I would later hear about in the rooms of A.A. I felt His presence and knew things would be okay. And they were. I worked with my pastor and others in the church to expand my understanding of how my Creator wanted me to live. →

Fast forwarding about 35 years, I was sitting in a hotel room a few miles from my home. I had checked in just to have a place to be alone and drink. Thoughts of suicide had been overwhelming me for quite a while. Alcohol had become my master and taken over my life. Everything felt so hopeless. I began to cry, and I began to pray. With no knowledge of A.A. or step one, I admitted to God that my life was hopeless, and I couldn't go on living this way. I asked Him to help me. And in that moment, I experienced what I did so many years prior. It was an overwhelming spiritual experience of peace and knowing that God was there with me. And everything would be okay.

I fell asleep and woke the next morning. I checked out and returned home. The thought occurred to me to look for an A.A. meeting. There would be one that evening one mile from my house, and I made it there. That was December 2, 2018. Thanks to my Higher Power, the 12 steps, and the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous, I have not had a drink since.

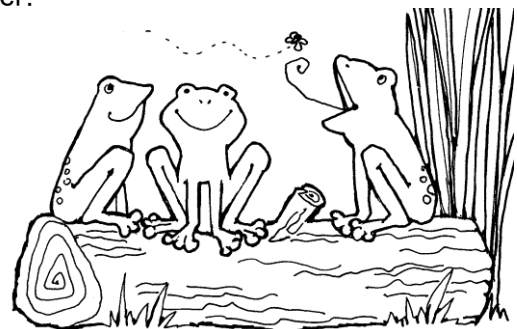
## Service Positions Available

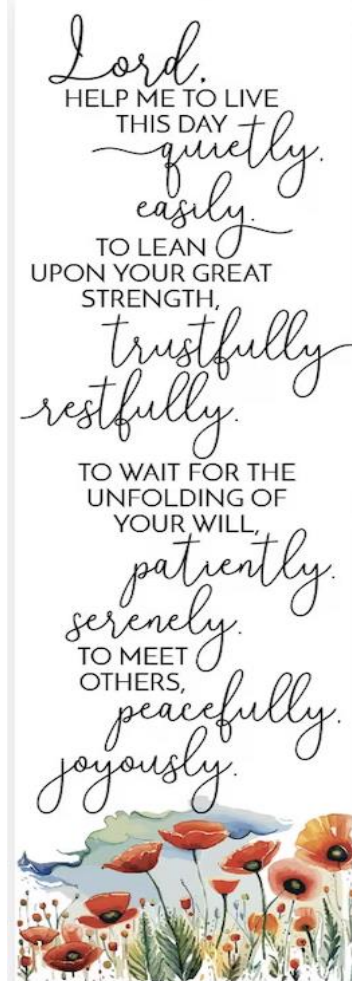
