In a Spiritual Kindergarten

was seventeen, my life had been shaped by a mix of fortunate circumstances, uncertainties, and perceived disappointments, common to many at that age. In mid-October of my junior year in high school, after a heated and poorly delivered argument with my stepmom, I dropped out of school. On the 17th of that month, I was in the U.S. Army, on a Greyhound bus headed to boot camp, oblivious to the ongoing Vietnam War. I began drinking when I was seventeen. Overall, it was enjoyable, filled with memorable moments, and didn't lead to significant consequences, except for some occasional risky behaviors between the ages of 19 and 27. Life events, an instinctual pattern of adaptation, and their positive and negative consequences, became glaringly evident to me during my 4th step inventory. Before my mid-50s, I had experienced much fortune such as good employment, a wonderful wife and marriage, a college education, and more. These blessings might typically make someone feel grateful and humble. However, as Bill W. writes in "The Next Frontier: Emotional Sobriety", "... those adolescent urges that so many of us have for top approval, perfect security, and perfect romance — urges quite appropriate to age seventeen — prove to be an impossible way of life when we are at age

I was born on July 12, which coincidentally marks my sobriety date in 2022. By the time I

In July of 2022, my excessive alcoholism and behavior had pushed my loving wife's patience, kindness, and understanding to their limits. My subtle dishonesty, blatant lies, lack of intimacy, and verbal abuse had reached rock bottom. After numerous broken promises and failed attempts to change my life over the years, faced with the end of my marriage, I finally recognized that I needed help.

forty-seven or fifty-seven." Without perspective, emotional and spiritual growth, disaster

can occur. In my 50s, I began drinking heavily and eventually transitioned to becoming

alcoholic for over ten years, causing sadness and pain to those around me.

Three days later, I anxiously walked toward an A.A. meeting room. A man smoking outside greeted me. Knowing the meeting was a closed men's gathering, I said something like, "I'm not a member." Without hesitation, he asked if I wanted to stop drinking. I said, "Yes!" "Then you're a member." he said.

Step 1 in Alcoholics Anonymous suggests admitting powerlessness over alcohol and that life has become unmanageable. When I stepped over the threshold of A.A.'s door, that principle was undeniable. However, it required having sufficient experiences (the wily cousin to perspective) to convince me of that fact, being 'roasted, toasted and well done on both sides' a few times.

Before entering the meeting room, I had faced some of life's challenges and disappointments with reasonable effort and success. The concept of being "powerless" ...

had never occurred to me. I struggled to control my drinking, always believing that I could make a change and regain control. Now, I realize that had been an alcoholic's rationalization. Those successes were often the result of an abundance of inexplicable kindness or compassion.

My juvenile understanding was ignorant to the hidden dangers that Dr. Tiebout described as "His Majesty the Baby" in his essay "The Ego Factors in Surrender in Alcoholism." A crucial aspect lingering in the shadow of my consciousness was my inability to recognize what we in A.A. refer to as selfish self-centeredness, "the root cause of all our problems."

Adding to the mix of powerlessness was my complete lack of knowledge about alcoholism as a disease, including both its physical and psychological aspects. As the "Foreword to the First Edition of 1939" states, "Many do not comprehend that the alcoholic is a very sick person."

At the time, I had only a limited understanding of the organization Alcoholics Anonymous. I didn't know that A.A. had a spiritual solution to alcoholism. I was not looking for a "spiritual solution" to my situation. I just wanted to stop drinking and feeling worthless.

Step 1 in the "12 and 12" states that "few ... try to practice the A.A. program unless they have hit bottom." My rock bottom involved typical behaviors such as hiding bottles, being falling-down drunk, and experiencing shakes so severe that I couldn't write my name when necessary. Also included were tumblers of whiskey every night until I was literally "stinking" drunk and passed out. While my years of alcoholism didn't reach the extreme depths of hellish experiences that others have faced, they were enough for me to recognize self-deception, dishonesty, anxiety, fear, and the overwhelming mental, emotional, and physical powerlessness of alcoholism.

That was my perspective on the third Saturday evening in July at the A.A. men's meeting. There, I experienced kindness and acceptance. Without my asking, they gave me the book Alcoholics Anonymous through the generosity of a member along with a list of names and numbers I could call for help.

During the following weeks and months, with the support of my wife, I attended meetings, diligently read the Big Book and the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions. I spent hours listening to Joe and Charlie and many other audio recordings. Convinced of the first step, I had to come to terms with Step 2.

I was neither atheistic nor agnostic at the time. I was essentially indifferent to whatever Power may or may not have existed. Over the years, I have studied philosophy, comparative religions, and metaphysics. However, that information had not helped before nor was it helping then. I wasn't looking for anything spiritual. I just wanted to stop drinking. I desperately saw the 12 steps and the Saturday men's meetings as my only hope for regaining sanity.

Step 3 occurred one evening while I was discussing my progress in A.A. with my wife. While sitting on the edge of our coffee table, I explained that A.A. had to be my higher power and wholeheartedly committed to working the steps. (I also made that commitment with my sponsor sometime later.) The steps and the A.A. group became the concrete formula for improving my life.

With this new perspective, I listened to audio recordings and read all I could about... *Continued on page 5 ...*

I had the curious feeling that my alcoholic condition was relieved, as in fact it proved to. Quite as important was the discovery that spiritual principles would solve all my problems. I have since been brought into a way of living infinitely more satisfying. and I hope, more useful than the life I lived before. My old manner of life was by no means a bad one, but I would not exchange its best moments for the worst moments I have now. I would not go back to it even if I could.

Much to our relief, we discovered we did not need to consider another's conception of God. Our own conception, however inadequate, was sufficient to a Creative Intelligence, a Spirit of the Universe underlying the totality of things, we began to be possessed of a new sense of power and direction, provided we took other simple steps. Tradition 7 (Long Form)

The A.A. groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contributions of their own members. We think that each group should soon achieve this ideal; that any public solicitation of funds using the name

of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous, whether by groups, clubs, hospitals, or other outside agencies; that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever, is unwise. Then, too, we view with much concern those A.A. treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated A.A. purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority.

Step 4. One morning, I made my first attempt at it but was unsatisfied with the result. I tried again, more methodically, taking my time, and, following the format outlined in the Big Book, I completed it.

Completing a 4th step A.A. inventory was similar to previous attempts made while seeking psychiatric help and studying metaphysical schools and practices. The crucial difference for me was the inclusion of the 4th column in the inventory. In that column, "... we resolutely look for our own mistakes," specifically, identifying where I had been selfish, dishonest, and self-seeking. Of paramount importance was discovering my own deep-seated fear and misperceptions, and asking "Where were we (was I) to blame?" This perspective brought about a unique shift in my mindset, a subtle but significant "psychic change," altering my attitude toward my responsibilities. I began considering how I could have acted differently.

Up to that point, I was hesitant about getting an A.A. sponsor. However, the Big Book warns, "Going it alone in spiritual matters is dangerous." My ego may have been a factor, but I was also considering approaching a minister or maybe seeing a psychologist or psychiatrist as I had done in the past. These alternative approaches began losing their appeal after realizing I needed someone intimately familiar with Alcoholics Anonymous; another alcoholic. I began attending a couple of meetings a week and started looking for someone I would feel comfortable doing a 5th step with. In time, that "itty-bitty miracle" happened.

At my sponsor's suggestion, I began attending different types of meetings and reading recommended literature. One story that stood out was "Acceptance Was the Answer" in the Big Book. He recommended the book "Living Sober" and later gave me "Drop the Rock." The two essays on Steps 6 and 7 in the 12 and 12 were especially helpful as Alcoholics Anonymous only briefly describes them in two paragraphs. The essays emphasize the importance of understanding that my Higher Power doesn't just instantly "render us (me) white as snow,"

without my cooperation and that I must strive for the "precious quality" of humility in "character building."

My amends began with my wife. The realization of harm and patterns of behavior learned from the 4th step meant doing more than just apologizing. My many past apologies alone had never brought about behavioral changes. Actions needed to demonstrate a willingness and desire to change. In that effort, I found the text "Living Sober" helpful, particularly section 15, "Watching out for Anger and Resentments." Taking the necessary steps to make things right in all circumstances is not easy for me, or anyone, and requires an ongoing conscious effort and practice. I realize this includes forgiveness, acceptance, and having reasonable expectations.

During a meeting with my sponsor, we discussed steps 10, 11, and 12. What stood out to me was the distinction between "maintenance" and "continued growth," highlighting the importance of not just maintaining current self-awareness but striving to "grow in understanding and effectiveness." Central to this effort is morning "quiet time" for reading and "mindfulness" meditations. Step 11 in the 12 and 12 makes clear the "direct linkage" and benefit between self-examination, meditation, and prayer. As I approach two years of sobriety, I see the Big Book and the 12 steps as a map for an ongoing journey of experiences and a maturing perspective in physical and emotional sobriety.

Reading the chapter "His Spiritual Quest" in "Dr. Bob and the Good Old Timers" brought me comfort. I can relate to his description of his gradual and slow spiritual experience as a journey rather than a sudden revelation. As a dedicated seeker, he was always open to different perspectives. Dr. Bob once said, "I don't think we can do anything very well in this world unless we practice it." His comment faithfully embodies the idea that we should "practice these (A.A.) principles in all our affairs."

- Childcare Availability


