



COMMUNIQUE

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Step 8 (from the Big Book):

"Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all."

1. The Core Purpose of Step 8

- **Healing relationships** by acknowledging the harm we caused in addiction.
- **Preparing for real amends** (Step 9) by getting honest, thorough, and spiritually willing.
- **Building humility** — we stop defending old behavior and accept responsibility.
- **Clearing emotional debris** — resentment, guilt, shame, and fear lose their power when we face them.
- **Learning willingness** — Step 8 is about the heart, not the action. Step 9 is the action.

2. What Step 8 *Is Not*

- Not making amends yet.
- Not reopening old wounds or forcing contact.
- Not a punishment or selfish harming exercise.
- Not about who harmed *us* — only who *we* harmed.

3. How to Work Step 8

A. Make the List

Write down **every person, institution, or group** you harmed through:

- Dishonesty
- Manipulation
- Broken promises
- Neglect
- Anger or abuse
- Financial harm
- Emotional harm
- Selfishness
- Addiction-driven behavior

Tip: Use your Step 4 inventory as your foundation. Anyone who appears in resentment, fear, or harms should be considered.

Identify the Specific Harm

For each name, write:

- **What exactly happened**
- **How your actions affected them**
- **What part of self was involved** (selfishness, fear, pride, dishonesty, etc.)

This keeps the list honest and avoids vague “I was a bad person” thinking.

Sort the List

Create three categories:

1. **Ready Now** You feel spiritually willing and emotionally prepared.
2. **Need More Willingness** You’re not ready yet — fear, resentment, or shame still block you.
3. **Maybe Never** Situations where contact would cause more harm (e.g., legal issues, unsafe people, old relationships where reaching out would reopen wounds).

Important: Even “Maybe Never” stays on the list — willingness is the goal, not contact.

Become Willing

This is the spiritual work of Step 8.

Ways to build willingness:

- Pray for willingness (even if you don’t feel it).
- Talk honestly with your sponsor.
- Remember how Step 1 humbled you.
- Consider how freedom grows when we stop hiding.
- Ask yourself: “*What would God have me do?*”
- Visualize the relief of living with integrity.

Willingness often grows slowly — that’s normal.

Check Your Motives

Before moving to Step 9, ask:

- Am I doing this to relieve guilt, or to truly repair harm?
- Am I expecting forgiveness?
- Am I trying to control the outcome?
- Am I spiritually grounded enough to approach this person?

Step 8 is about **clean motives**, not quick fixes.

The Spiritual Gifts of Step 8

- **Courage** — facing the truth without running.
- **Humility** — accepting our part without excuses.
- **Compassion** — seeing others as human beings we affected.
- **Freedom** — guilt and shame lose their grip.
- **Integrity** — we begin living as the person God is shaping us to be.

In All Our Affairs: Lessons in a Spiritual Kindergarten

There is a belief that Bill Wilson intended to write a sequel to the book “Alcoholics Anonymous.” It was meant to be a treatise on the transitional phase from the physical “allergy” and mental obsession to the long-term work of “emotional sobriety.” For reasons that remain unclear, the book was never written. However, its intended themes can be discerned from “Grapevine” essays published between 1957 and 1962, which were later republished in “The Language of the Heart,” Part Three: 1958-1970.

Eight articles found in “Part Three, Segment 1: In All Our Affairs” stand out as fundamental issues directed toward the practice of living A.A.’s Twelve Principles, “... in all our affairs;” “In All Our Affairs” being the planned title for the book. These articles are:

- The Next Frontier: Emotional Sobriety: January 1958
- Take Step Eleven, June 1958
- God As We Understand Him: The Dilemma of No Faith, April 1961
- Humility for Today, June 1961
- This Matter of Honesty, August 1961
- This Matter of Fear, January 1962
- What Is Acceptance? March 1962
- Spiritual Experiences, July 1962

Five other essays appear in Segment 1, which should not be overlooked or undervalued; the same is true for the entirety of “The Language of the Heart.”

Within the titles of these articles are pivotal issues confronting all of us, both alcoholic and non-alcoholic: faith, humility, honesty, fear, and acceptance. As I read and reread them, an inspirational energy emerges, affirming the A.A. lessons of a “spiritual kindergarten.”

In the essay *Take Step Eleven*, Bill Wilson writes that we can “become dissatisfied; we have to admit we have hit an uncomfortable and maybe a very painful sticking point.” Bill’s essays offer a remedy. In *The Next Frontier Emotional Sobriety*, he gives us his unvarnished experience as an example.

In *God As We Understand Him*, I experienced what Bill explains as an “unconscious arrogance.” That, “God as I understood him had to be for everybody.”

In *Humility for Today*, I recognized myself in his reiteration of an “old-time admonition”: “Don’t try to get too damned good by Thursday.”

All these essays have sparked some identification with personal issues, happening at the time or with past events. There is a wellspring of spiritual waters in these works. Are you thirsty? I often find myself returning for a sip.

AA INTERGROUP

An AA Intergroup (sometimes called a Central Office) exists to help AA groups work together more effectively while respecting each group's autonomy. Anyone interested in supporting that purpose can attend many Intergroup meetings, although voting privileges are often limited by local bylaws.

Typically, those who should attend include:

- **Intergroup Representatives (IGRs):** Members selected by their home group to represent it, bring information to Intergroup, and report back to their group.
- **Group General Service Representatives (GSRs):** While GSRs primarily serve in General Service rather than Intergroup, they may attend to improve communication between the two service structures if local practices allow.
- **Intergroup Officers and Committee Chairs:** Such as the chairperson, secretary, treasurer, literature chair, hotline coordinator, website coordinator, and event coordinators.
- **AA Members Interested in Service:** Any sober AA member who wants to learn more about service work or volunteer, if the local Intergroup welcomes observers and volunteers.

Volunteers: Members who answer the hotline, staff the office, manage literature, coordinate meeting lists, organize events, or assist with other Intergroup services.

Why attend?

Attending an Intergroup meeting gives members an opportunity to:

- Learn how AA services are provided in the local community.
- Volunteer to help carry the message.
- Help coordinate activities among local groups.
- Discuss literature, meeting schedules, public information, and special events.

Share ideas about how to better serve alcoholics seeking help.

Who usually does not attend?

Intergroup meetings are generally **not intended for people seeking recovery for the first time** unless they have an interest in service. Newcomers are usually encouraged to focus first on attending regular AA meetings, finding a sponsor, and working the Twelve Steps. As sobriety grows, many members discover that service through Intergroup is a rewarding way to strengthen their own recovery.

A common saying in AA is:

"Service is gratitude in action."

Intergroup is one of the places where that gratitude is put into practice by helping ensure that **when anyone, anywhere reaches out for help, the hand of AA is there.**

 his habit was to always be inebriated

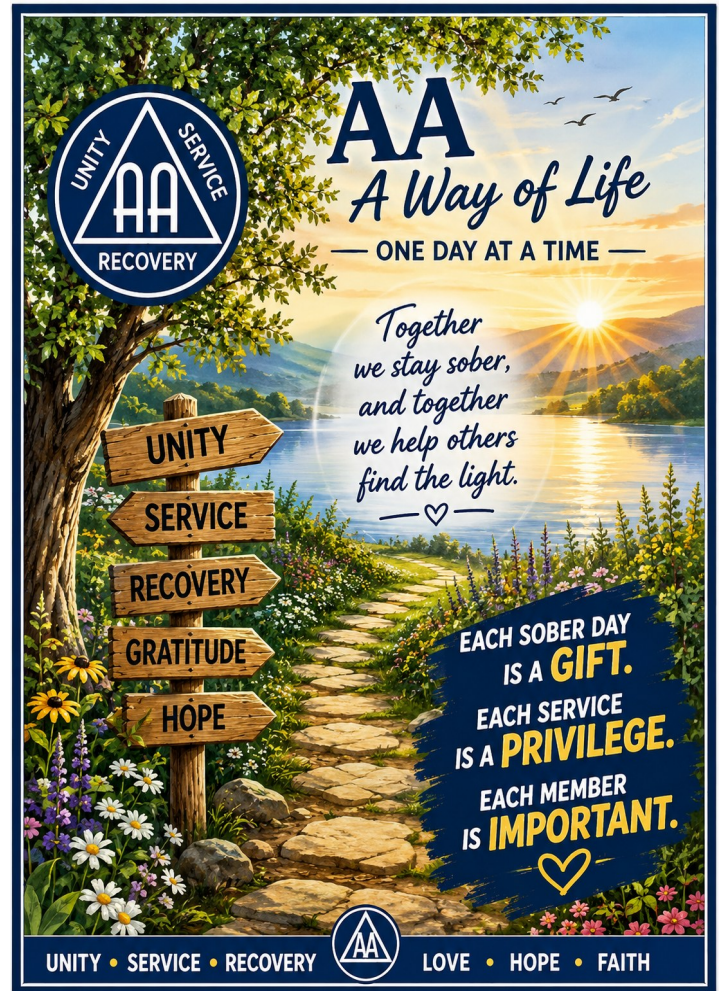
could there be another way of living

AA Tradition 8 is a cornerstone of Alcoholics Anonymous' service philosophy. It states:

“Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.”

Here's what that means in practice:

Core Idea

- AA members share their experience, strength, and hope **freely**, not for pay.
- The fellowship's spiritual foundation depends on **voluntary service** and mutual aid, not professional counseling or therapy.

Practical Application

- **Nonprofessional spirit:** Members help each other as equals, not as experts.
- **Special workers:** AA may hire people for administrative or technical tasks (like secretaries, janitors, or bookkeepers), but not for carrying the message of recovery.

Spiritual Principle

Tradition 8 reminds us that recovery is built on **love and service**, not commerce. It protects AA's integrity by keeping the message pure and the motive selfless.
